# TIPPECANOE COUNTY COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

TUESDAY, February 12, 2019 8:30 a.m.

Tippecanoe Room, Tippecanoe County Office Building 20 N 3rd Street, Lafayette, Indiana

**Councilmembers present**: President Bryan Metzger, Vice President Kevin Underwood, John Basham Kathy Vernon, Ilana Stonebraker, Lisa Dullum. Roland Winger was absent.

**Others present**: Attorney Doug Masson, Auditor Robert A. Plantenga, and Recording Secretary John Thomas.

## I. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

President Metzger called the meeting to order, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

## II. AUDITOR'S FINANCIAL REPORT - Bob Plantenga

The 2019 financial statement shows a General Fund beginning cash balance of \$10,224,887.37. The projected miscellaneous revenue, property taxes and deductions for circuit breakers leaves the total funds available of \$58,639,593.37. When deducting encumbrances, the 2019 Budget and minimum balances established by Council the beginning net balance is \$1,876,533.37. Since there were no additional appropriations last month the beginning balance available for appropriations is \$1,876,533.37.

The Revenue Report shows only the first month of the year so there little to report. The Other Taxes/Local Income Tax (fund 0111) is received every month and will be consistent throughout the year. The Other Financial Services/Misc. are uncashed checks that can be deposited back into their original fund after a couple years and reflects the outstanding checks from 2016.

The fund balances show: 1) the General Fund (1000) is at \$8.2 million which will trend down until June when it is replenished with property taxes. The Motor Vehicle Highway-Restricted (fund 1173) and the MVH-unrestricted (fund 1176) will be discussed later. The state has required that 50% of the MVH funds be used only for construction and reconstruction and be accounted for separately as is shown for January. The County Self Insurance (fund 4710) receipts for January were twice the disbursements with a healthy fund total of over \$6.5 million.

#### III. TREASURER'S REPORT – Jenifer Weston

The Account Balances and Interest Rates report was distributed and shows an account balance of \$108,186,587.71 with total interest of \$192,792.73. Interest rates increased in December and our average rates are 2.55% and 2.6% on our primary accounts. With recent discussions about the Solid Waste District having its own ledger and fund, a new bank account has been established and is now fund 4930. On the second page of the handout the interest rate trends show January starting out with a higher rate. The last page shows our investments with greater details on institution, yield, maturity dates, length of term and 2018 -2019 comparisons. Interest rates will be stable for this year with maybe one increase, thus we want to lock in rates for 3-5 year investments.

Council member Dullum asked if the interest rate trends were incorporated into the forecasted revenues and after discussion the Auditor stated yes.

This is a grant from the State Department of Health for the mobile health clinic unit. This will provide the down payment for the unit and be used for syringe services and public health outreach. Total cost of the unit will be \$160,000 to \$175,000 and the Department has the rest of the funds available from carry over funds. Maintenance and gas will be paid for from HIV grants and not from the General Fund.

President Metzger asked if there were any additional questions or comments. Hearing none he called for the vote. <u>Motion carried</u>.

•Councilmember Vernon moved to approve the appropriation as presented, second by Councilmember Basham.

Councilmember Vernon and Stonebraker thanked the Auditor's office and Mr. Kline for the time they committed to separating out the Motor Vehicle Highway fund (MVH) accounts. Mr. Kline stated that as mentioned earlier, the State recently restricted 50% of the MVH funds to only construction related costs. That necessitated a change in the Highway Department's accounting. Some expenses are clearly construction related but others, like salaries, can be both. Determinations of construction and non-construction related expenses have been made and are reflected in the Local Option Income Tax (LOIT) and MVH fund reductions and appropriations presented today. The Auditor distributed the new state guidelines and revisions to the tables that replace those in the Council packet. There is no change to the total amount of funds, just the sources those funds come from. There was discussion of what type of costs (maintenance, salaries, equipment purchases, contracts and materials) can come from different funding sources (LOIT, MVH, MVH restricted, Local Road & Street, etc.). There will be more adjustments next month as additional changes are made to realign expenses and funding sources.

President Metzger asked if there were any additional questions or comments. Hearing none he called for the vote. Motion carried.
